# Challenging the Status Quo

It's a privilege to have been invited to write for this edition of the Rock. I hope you find my submission both interesting and thought provoking. It's a privilege for me, too, to be helping out with leading services across the benefice. But having retired from full time ministry for a while now I do find myself asking the question "why am I still doing this"? Part of the answer lies in the fact that I have always found myself to be someone who feels compelled to challenge the status quo. Status quo, that is, maintaining the same situation without changes. The bible tells us that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever. I believe that to be true but, paradoxically, the only thing that remains the same is Jesus constantly challenging the status quo with all those he encountered and encounters - yesterday, today and forever. Why? Because the way of Jesus is about creating outward looking loving supportive relationship through service and engagement rather than resting on our laurels in isolated comfort and familiarity. No wonder I, and many others, are followers of the greatest challenger of the status quo of all time!

Unfortunately an ingrained preference for maintaining the status quo can keep a person/organisation from considering other options. The church in particular, in resisting change, potentially missing out on exciting Godgiven opportunities. The Christian 'journey' is all about rebirth and renewal. It's an amazing adventure. An extraordinary God initiated wonderful healing transformation in those who believe in Jesus that should mean a constant questioning and challenging of the norms we all too easily adopt and resolutely stick to in both church and society.

With regards church Christmas can present a good example. We establish the same situation without changes year in, year out, all too easily risking rendering the extraordinary miracle of God becoming a human being (in ways that did not conform to the status quo in any way) benign, quaint, nostalgic, sentimental. So in order to avoid the above as the benefice moves into vacancy (and Advent, Christmas and New Year) I encourage you, dare to question, challenge the status quo, prayerfully seek wisdom and direction from God, give the opportunities that present a chance and, who knows, by doing so we may find ourselves meaningfully assisting in the building of God's kingdom here in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

**Children in Distress:** As usual our December and Christmas charity is Children in Distress, a small UK Christian charity which for 34 years has raised funds in the UK to help the most vulnerable children in Romania and provide specialist Hospice care, educational community outreach and respite care for children, their families, and carers.

Their initial focus of caring for children with HIV/AIDS has evolved into provision of respite, palliative and end- oflife care, and they have developed some of the best trained and most experienced paediatric nurses in Romania. They are now focussing on Casa Maria, their Children's Family House that provides care for twelve children living with the most severe disabilities. They also provide grants for twenty children over a six month period each year through Jansen Community Education Outreach, a community-based holistic education project

For nearly 30 years Thurlestone church has sponsored children through Children in Distress, seeing the difference the charity has made to these children's lives. The sponsorship has now changed to sponsoring all the children in Casa Maria. You can contribute to the work of Casa Maria and Children in Distress at Coffee-Time during **December and January** or at the **Carol Service on December 22nd**.

Rather than send individual cards to church members, sign one of the large **Alternative Christmas Cards** in church or the Meeting Room and put your donation in the Children in Distress box provided. If you are unable to do any of these and you would like to help *Children* in Distress, you can scan this QR code. # The Vacancy in the Benefice

## Information about the Vacancy in the Benefice

Churchwardens from across the Benefice, our LLMs Nell Stamp, Pam Latimer and Peter Gornall and Revd. Colin Snell had a really positive meeting with the Archdeacon of Totnes on the afternoon, Wednesday November 22nd.

A very high level summary of the meeting is as follows.

- 1. The Archdeacon worked through with us key things we need to have in place to ensure the smooth running within the parishes of services, weddings, funerals, burials etc. in the absence of an incumbent. Much is already in place and your Church Wardens and Ministry Team will ensure any outstanding items are quickly put in place.
  - a. One important item is that each Church will have publicly visible notices on who (name and Phone Number) should be contacted for pastoral matters in their Parish during the vacancy.
  - b. It is also vital that a safeguarding officer is appointed as soon as possible either for each parish or across the Benefice
- 2. The meeting had a very open discussion regarding the way forward for the Benefice, with the Archdeacon seeking an understanding of what is important to each parish.
- 3. Regarding the appointment of a new priest
  - a. The Archdeacon supports a new appointment, but it will not be a like-for-like replacement i.e. not full-time either House for Duty or part time priest;
  - b. The Archdeacon is keen to move things on and we will be looking at various options for the way forward;
  - c. If we can find a suitable way forward in the near future, we may be able to appoint during the Summer.
  - d. We hope to be able to give more details after Christmas.
- 4. As church communities, our focus at this point should be on prayer, and seeking God's way forward for our Parishes, and Benefice. Specifically the Archdeacon asked that we focus on seeking God's vision for our parishes. What would God like to see in our Parishes in 7 Years time?
- 5. Mike Hodges will convene monthly Benefice prayer meetings, and meetings of the Benefice vacancy group when required.

This is really encouraging and we would ask for your prayers that a way forward may be found soon.

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# The Bible Matters

## The Heart of Christmas

We're at that time of year again! But is Christmas just about the shopping, tree or presents? At its heart, Christmas is all about a God who has showed up on earth. The Creator of the universe, whose hands flung stars into space, cared enough to come to earth as a tiny baby. 'The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us.' (John 1:14)

Every year we sing carols and retell the same story of the donkey, innkeeper, stable, angels, shepherds, star, wise men, gifts and Mary and Joseph with baby! Why do we do all this? It's to remind us that God deals with the mess of our world by sending His Son to die in our place.

This makes it possible for us to have a relationship with Himself:

When the time came, He "did not consider equality with God something to be used to His own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to death - even death on a cross! (Philippians 2:6-8)

Reflecting on Jesus in the manger is a great place to start understanding the heart of the Christmas message. However, it's so much more than simply a cute baby lying in the bed of straw:

If our greatest need had been information, God would have sent us an educator; If our greatest need had been technology, God would have sent us a scientist; If our greatest need had been money, God would have sent us an economist; If our greatest need had been pleasure, God would have sent us an entertainer; But our greatest need was forgiveness, so God sent us a Saviour.






## Why churchwardens love January

### A New Year Promise to our readers


Some of you have noticed a few typos in the magazine now and then. To improve this, for 2024 I am using a new set of rules for editing. They are as follows:
