



# Meetings held on 1st February & 1st March 2010 News and Views by Citizen

### ATTENDANCES

There were six Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk, the District Councillor, two Police and eight members of the public present at the February meeting. For the March meeting there were six Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk, the Tree Warden and six members of the public in attendance.

### OPEN FORUM

### # Local Development Plan

45 properties are now planned for the preferred site (No 1). Parishioners will remember it was only 15 late last year! Bets can be placed on the number that will be announced next time.

### # Post Office Lane

Concern was raised about speeding vehicles if the pot holes are repaired. Speed humps were suggested but these create noise. Pot holes, however, do slow traffic down. Grant Thornton the liquidators who 'own' the lane are to be consulted.

### # Parking signs

Too many signs are around the church. One has already been removed from the green, but those put up by Parking Control Services are considered too 'jazzy'. Parish signs are on the list of things to be sorted out under the Parish Plan, particularly now that Yarmer restrictions have caused cars to park on the hill by the golf club.... which is now legal apart from some prohibition between April and September.

### # Dog Poo Bin

Yet again a bin was requested for the top of Thurlestone. The authorities still say they have not enough money to provide this, and there seems little prospect of any extra funds becoming available.

### **PARISH HALL**

Councillor **Peter Hurrell** reported that: finances were in profit, the double-glazed window tricklevent screws had been replaced with stainless

steel ones (under warranty), the heating system had been amended, exterior and some interior repainting will be carried out this spring.

### HIGHWAYS

Councillor Geoffrey Stidston said the problem re the excessive number of 'No Parking' signs could be addressed with John Halliday, Chief Assistant Engineer of Devon County Council at an April meeting. Lower road in West Buckland, where the road splits towards Grove Cottage, again has rubbish blocking the pipe that takes water under the road. There are two large pot holes near Widecombe House, on the Bantham road. Construction and other lorries are damaging the pavement and kerb stones in Glebe Field due to parked cars causing obstruction. Sat navs are directing traffic down Post Office Lane.

### FOOTPATHS & HERITAGE COAST

It would seem that protection to the cliff adjacent to the Golf Club's first green and the road to South Milton is questionable. Who pays? A severe storm could well breach the cliff, the path, the first green and the road. The cliff footpath towards Bantham beyond the green hut has a dangerous hole caused by badgers. This and the badgers are untouchable by law. Walkers beware!

### SCHOOL

Chairman Councillor Andrew Rhymes reported that the school had recently obtained a national grade one Information Communications
Technology (ICT) mark. Building work and fund-raising continues. Just under 50% of the children are from the catchment area. An Ofsted inspection is expected this year. Car parking at the Parish Hall was discussed (yet again) at a meeting between the school and the parish Hall representatives with no way forward apparent at present. The main problem is caused at times when parking spaces are denied to Hall users. One suggestion was parking by ticket with a manned entrance.

### DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

District Councillor Shonaugh Rankin said there would be a £1.3 million budget gap as SHDC received the second lowest amount of government grant per head in Devon. Plans are afoot by SHDC and South Devon Rural Housing to build two pairs of semis on the old Telephone Exchange site (opposite the Village Inn on the corner of Parkfield) to a high eco code. A meeting has been requested with the developer to discuss the proposal.

### POLICE

Community Support Officer **Dave Gibson** said there were no crimes to report and that the street surgeries were going down well with the publicmail drops having identified their locations.

### PARISH PLAN

Councillor Kit Marshall said that very little response to the questionnaire had been received. A small steering team had now been assembled, consisting of himself, Alan Taylor Bigg, and several other parishioners. Two meetings have been held with four or five important, but non-controversial, issues identified, concerning the proposed new building plans, signs, improving Broadband and mobile phone reception, the Best Kept Village competition.

### LOCAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Councillor **Dale Came** said the official report is not due until March, when there will be a period of consultation for objectors

### TREES

Hal Plews said that trees removed from Grove Cottage are to be replaced with new plantings.

### Weter Gornall Writes:

I'M BETTING THEY HAVEN'T FINISHED HIM OFF.



When you've got a night incident to manage, it's harder prising the wakeful soldiers away from their dice game than rousing the sleepers. "Get out there, and now. Now", I shouted. "There's a mob outside the praetorium and the Governor doesn't like it. Keep order, for heaven's sake. And you'll need torch bearers."

The mob was actually manageable when we arrived. But you could hear someone trying to stir them up, and the worry was that they were waiting for some signal to start big trouble. So no surprise that mayhem broke out when a prisoner came out with the Governor. They bayed for death. The Governor was very unhappy and obviously hadn't expected that at all. He took the prisoner back inside. Still the crowd shouted and chanted. They went frantic again when eventually the prisoner was led out a second time. By now he had been flogged, and a fancy robe had been put over him to hide the lash marks and blood. Someone had gone to the trouble of weaving acanthus stems as a tiara too.

So another put-up job, rent-a-crowd, by the priests. I've seen it before. The governor hadn't any hope of getting some calm. He took the prisoner back inside, and then reappeared on his own to try to bargain. By now he had lost control of the scene. So he handed the prisoner over and we were detailed to keep order through the city and outside. There were crosses ready for Barabbas and his gang, so we made him carry one of those. Fancy letting Barabbas out – we will be the ones accused of not keeping order now.

Strange really. You would expect someone in his position to show either total panic or deflance and bravado. Nothing like that with this man; just silent dignity; even a sense of purpose, I thought, in spite of the state of him after the flogging.

The weather was weird, and after being up since all hours it was a long day. But he kept up that dignified quietness, in the face of all sorts of abuse. The priests who came to check up on him seemed to think they'd finished him. I'm not so sure. I think they chose the wrong one to try to put away. Dead he may be, and in a rock tomb with a guard on it. But my guess is that this will run and run. The dice addicts aren't taking any bets on that.

# YOUR CHANCE TO CONTRIBUTE TO A BETTER FUTURE FOR THE PARISH OF THURLESTONE

The Parish Plan Action Group has set out four major AIMS for the plan

- ♦ Preserve the existing environment
- ♦ Improve the infrastructure
- ♦ Make the Parish somewhere to be proud of
- Create a better balanced community

There will be lots of opportunity for Parishioners to contribute more ideas, but rather than concentrating on producing a document in the first instance, we have picked five ACTIONS, which we believe will improve the Parish. They all contribute to at least one of our aims. We want to get started on these straightaway, but need some VOLUNTEERS willing to help.

### FIVE ACTIONS TO IMPROVE LIFE IN THE PARISH

### 1. New Buildings and affordable homes

The Parish Survey showed that new building/second homes/affordable housing is a major concern to Parishioners. We need to build a real understanding and expertise so that the Parish can be defended against bureaucrats and planners seeking to impose unacceptable plans. We need a volunteer (perhaps with legal or planning experience) to do the desk research, review laws and practice and brief the Parish Council. In fact to become the Parish expert.

### 2. Signage

The centre of the Parish is blighted by a plethora of disparate signs. We need a designer to produce a Parish protocol/design guide to be adopted by the Parish Council.

### 3. Technology

Recent government reports have stressed the need to improve broadband and mobile telephony in rural areas. We believe that BT came close to improving the cable from South Milton. There must be an opportunity to incentivise them to support the Parish. We need a champion to approach providers to improve facilities.

### 4. Emergency Post

Some Emergency and First Aid is available in the Parish, but is scattered and little advertised. Pete Lawrence from Bantham (and the Life Savers) has volunteered to co-ordinate existing facilities and identify medical and other relevant expertise.

### 5. Best Kept Villages

We should aim for one of our villages to win this in 2 years time. We need knowledgeable and enthusiastic leaders for each village in the Parish to get us started.

### ETHIOPIA

(by Gillian Marshall)

Ethiopia (formerly Abyssinia) is one of the oldest countries in the world. It has never been colonized by a European power and is often referred to as the Cradle of Humanity. It has a fascinating history and a very diverse and beautiful landscape which is far from its image as a drought-ridden country.

We flew into Addis Ababa, the 3rd highest capital city in the world, at 2,400m. It is a chaotic, bustling city with a population of 3 million. From Addis we flew to Bahar Dar on the southern shore of Lake Tana, source of the Blue Nile. The Blue Nile flows into the Sudan and joins the White Nile at Khartoum. The lake is huge with many monasteries on and around it. Reed boats, known as tankwas, are still used on this lake. The men in our group visited a monastery (no women allowed) while we women visited a nunnery on another island but found a service going on with only male priests involved!! There is a very strong Christian influence in the country and Christianity is said to have reached Ethiopia soon after the death of Christ.


From Lake Tana we drove to **Gondar** (2,120m), former capital of Ethiopia, to visit the famed castles which were built in the 17th & 18th centuries by several generations of Ethiopian kings. It is here that the most important festival in the Ethiopian Calendar, known as Timkat, celebrating Epiphany, is held.


On the way we had a pit stop and visited a wonderful market in a small village called **Werota**. It was fascinating. People had come from distant villages to sell their produce such as chillies, cotton, cereals, vegetables and even donkeys! It was full of hustle and bustle and they stared at us as much as we stared at them. It was one of the highlights of our trip.

The drive from Gondar to **Debark** on the edge of the **Simien Mountains** was fairly rough and rugged and we had a puncture on the way. Our hotel in Debark, the Giant Lobelia, was very basic but the food, prepared in a small shack behind the hotel, was excellent. From there we drove up into the mountains for the most spectacular views of this highland plateau, capped by a dramatic skyline of jagged volcanic plugs and split by deep gorges and gullies. Here we did a 3hr trek along an escarpment, with a deep drop on one side, catching sight of many gelada baboons on the way.

From Debark we had a full day's drive to Axum along an unpaved road. Axum (2,131m) was the capital of the Kingdom of Axum, which was once one of the most powerful in the ancient world. It is the origin of Christianity in Ethiopia and is believed to be the resting place of the Ark of the Covenant. We saw the rather non-descript building where it is said to be housed, guarded by a priest who never leaves the chapel nor lets anyone enter! Axum is also home to the famous monolithic stelae, the tallest one still standing reaches over 21 metres. We also visited the ruined palace of the Queen of Sheba, who is said to have given birth to Menelik the First, fathered by King Solomon, the founder of Ethiopia's ruling family until the late Emperor Haile Selassie who died (probably murdered) in 1974.

From Axum we also visited the well-preserved stone **Moon Temple of Yeha** built in 600BC. The walls of this temple are 12m high. Next to the Temple was a fascinating tiny museum on the 1st floor of a nondescript building. The 'curator' showed us some wonderful ancient illuminated manuscripts - some at least 750 years old. The way they are stored and handled to be shown to the public is extraordinary. No question of 'don't touch'!





We flew to Lalibela (2,630m) to visit the famous and awesome 11 rock-hewn churches built by King Lalibela in the 12 Century. They are one of Ethiopia's top attractions and quite breathtaking. They are big and carved below ground level. Each church is unique in shape and size but the most famous one is Bet Giyorgis (St George). It is carved in the shape of a symmetrical cruciform tower. There was a priest/caretaker in each church who would don richly embroidered vestments and pose with crosses and ancient bibles – wearing sunglasses (due to constant camera flashes!)

There is another rock hewn monastery called Asheton Maryam built on a high ridge above Lalibela with amazing views over the countryside. We actually rode mules part of the way but had to dismount a couple of times to climb steep rocky paths. It was at an altitude of 3,666m and I was pleased to have made it!! Descending was almost more difficult than ascending.

From Lalibela we went south, via Addis, to **Wendo Genet**. It took us a long day to get there. It is a very fertile region and the lakes in the area abound in fish, water birds, flamingoes, ibis, and we even saw some hippopotamus.

I haven't mentioned food. The staple diet of the Ethiopians is *injera* which is a large pancake-shaped dough made from a nutty-tasting grain unique to Ethiopia. On to this they normally place a stew of some sort. We were there during lent so they had 'fasting food' – vegetarian only. The ritual is to break off a piece of the injera to scoop the stew into your mouth. The idea is that you all eat off the same plate and on our first evening in Addis this is what a group of us did. Interestingly, although tradition dictates eating with the right hand, four of us (out of 7) were left-handed! I have to admit that I don't like injera at all. The dough is fermented for up to three days before it is cooked and the result is a sort of spongy, grey, rather sour, 'pancake'.

Drinks: *Tej* is a popular local tipple, made from honey or sugar. It is rather like mead. They refer to it as honey wine. Ethiopian coffee however is wonderful and always freshly made by roasting the beans over a charcoal fire, then crushing them with a pestle and mortar and serving the coffee in small handle-less cups. A very unusual fruit juice was made from avocado mixed with mango juice. Sounds odd but it was delicious.

All in all it was a wonderful, exhausting trip. The people of Ethiopia are a blend of Arab and African, they are very friendly and possess enormous dignity. We even mastered a few words in Amharic which always raised a smile. *Chigger yellem* – no problem!







### THE CHILEAN EARTHQUAKE

[Twenty-four hours after this earthquake, Greg Barton (who lives in Chile) sent the following report to his parents, Jeanne and Michael Barton, by e-mail. Jeanne says "There have been so many kind phone calls of enquiry we thought people might like to read this first hand account".]

"Hi everyone, I hope Dad got through and let you know we are all OK. It is now midmorning Sunday 28th February.

We had a very comfortable night compared to last night! There have been many after-shocks and one that woke us all up and got us going again at 6 am this morning. I thought for a second it was all starting again.

The last twenty-four hours have been quite extraordinary. The country is a total mess. Where the quake was centred the place is like you saw it on the tv I imagine. Just like Haiti - total destruction, looting. There was footage of supermarkets being ransacked and a prison was broken in half as a result of the quake with criminals running the streets - total mayhem.

Where the epicentre was, 350 miles south west of here, they have no water and no power and are still cut off from most communications, but in my part of Santers it was not nearly so bad as the buildings have been constructed for earthquakes. The ones that were not (built years before) were the ones you probably saw on tv falling down, and a few split in half.

The quake happened at 3.34 am. The power of the actual two minutes when it was full 'eye of storm' was the most terrifying thing I have ever witnessed. The whole place was jumping and swaying - you can't imagine what it is like until it happens, the noise of the whole house falling apart. I saw massive cracks appearing in all our walls but they are stronger than you think and ours withstood. I had mates whose building lifts fell down the shaft crashing to the floor - Hollywood stuff. Some people couldn't open their front doors, we had to go and kick them in in order to get people out.

Plates and glasses were smashing all round. I had Antonia and was trying to stand straight

under the door frame, as was Anita with Fernie. All was pitch black, sirens going off, car alarms going off (imagine 500 all at the same time) Cars were jumping. The blast lasted two minutes with five minutes heavy after-sway which was also horrible as you expect more and don't know what to do. We all ran down the stairwell with the other residents, everyone screaming, people praying etc. It was the middle of the night and the head is spinning and you don't know how to react, don't know what's happening. In the two hours post-quake you just don't know what to expect. We have had twelve serious after-shocks and four of these were between 3 and 4 on Richter. The whole place wobbles again, frightening.

I went to see how bad my two offices were. One, which is on the second floor, was actually OK - a bit of roof had fallen in and we had lost three computers - dust and mess but nothing serious. The other, where I have 60 people on the eleventh floor, only two blocks away from the first one, was horrible. We had large pieces of furniture in there which wrecked the place. All 60 flat screens were on the floor - we lost about 25 work stations totally - our telephone and server room were down and lines and cables all over the place. No power, no water, some windows out, but we cleaned up a lot and have to wait till Monday to see how bad it is. All my people were trying to fix their houses and obviously no-one worries about the office...other than me! We will be working tomorrow, I hope.

Well, that's pretty much it so far. We had 15 people sleep over last night. Now we're trying to get back to normal and watch the Carling Cup final. If Man United win it will be a nice way to finish the most amazing weekend I have ever had....so far!

All our love to you all."

In 1961 we acquired the lease of The End Cottage and our lives changed forever. We had long family holidays in Bantham for almost thirty years from when I was about eight years old, as I recall. Over the years we had a succession of boats, each one slightly bigger than the last, and each one of which I was so proud of - starting with Dandy and culminating in our Salcombe yawl (Y85) which was Dad's pride and joy.

Bantham was a marvellous place to learn the do's and don'ts of sailing and we all had plenty of hard lessons, under the watchful eyes of Jim Elliott and Hughie Cater. Boats have been part of my life ever since......

On moving to San Francisco, I lived for ten years on a houseboat in Sausalito, just north of the Golden Gate Bridge. Every kind of boat was around me-boats that looked like boats, others that resembled floating castles, palaces, aeroplanes. Believe it or not, many of them had flower boxes in which grew the little Bantham daisy.

I watched every kind of boat come into the bay. One memorable day the

QE2 sailed in. It was an amazing and magnificent sight. She was so big, she could only just get under the Golden Gate Bridge - she had to wait for the tide to be at its lowest. As she came into the bay, hundreds and hundreds of little boats went out to greet her and we all blew our hooters and waved flags. Can you imagine the sight on a beautiful sunny day?

I have almost always owned a sail boat of some sort. My current boat, which I have just taken delivery of, is a 42-foot sloop. As it was a new boat I had the privilege of naming her. Without hesitation I chose the name Bantham. Sailing in San Francisco, albeit on a slightly different scale, shares many similarities with sailing in Bantham - strong tides, westerly winds, and treacherous sand bars but here with lots of islands best avoided (Alcatraz for one).

When asked what the name *Bantham* means, I have great pleasure in taking people down below and showing them the pictures of Bantham mounted on the main cabin bulkheads.

So, from one Bantham to another, a tribute!





On the whole, we had a wetter, cooler but sunnier winter than last year. However, when I look at my garden, things are way behind last year - all because of the huge number of days of zero or below temperatures. Although the sun shone, it was too low on the horizon for any real effect. Add to that the constant searing and strong east winds, and the plants were very wise to keep hidden for a while. Nature has a habit of trying to look after its own! I wrote the above passage some days ago. Since then there have been frosts almost every day, the ground is cold and the grass blackened. It is time that the temperature rose both by day and by night.

Now it is almost vernal equinox time again, and it looks as though the winds may be in the western quarter this time. I say that because - as many of you know - my old Grandad from West Cornwall always said that 'where the wind was on equinox day, there it would predominately stay for the next six months'. There is some truth in it, but I guess it is, for the most part, a bit of a coincidence or luck. So make a note of the general direction on 21st March this year

and see where it is on every day until the September equinox. Remember the actual equinox can occur anywhere between 20th and 23rd March. Most of us, I reckon, decide that Spring begins on that day. Temperatures begin to rise by day as the input of the sun's heat becomes greater than the loss by cooling at night.

The tradition of Spring cleaning follows from this astronomical development and has become firmly rooted in the human psyche (male or female?). 20th March is the first day, on average, that the temperatures rise beyond 15.5°C. The arrival of warmer temperatures signals that the home no longer requires heating, and as wood or oil burning stoves and ranges or traditional open fires or deposit dust, soot and ash everywhere, now's the time (with the heating off until the autumn) for curtains, carpets and other domestic surfaces to get a thorough annual 'spring-clean'.

Continuing my journey through the equinox days in The Worst Kind of Snow, read on all you gardeners. Today should see all of you making the first cut on your lawn. Over the last twenty years a certain Mr Grisenthwaite, a pensioner from Kirkaldy, Fife, has kept a lawn-mowing diary! He started in 1984 and TWKS was first printed in 2007, so the authors had these twenty years of records to call on. Mr G. notes the date of his first cut and the last cut of the year, and all the cuts in between. Then he continues to record these facts for the succeeding twenty years. As the dates of the first and the last lawn cut are excellent indicators of the start and the end of the growing season, the result is a uniquely precious record of climate change - so important, in fact, that in 2006 academics borrowed Mr G's mowing diary to write a paper for the Royal Meteorological Society's Journal. As a result, we have hard evidence that, with the average last cut seventeen days later, the growing season has grown by a month. Remember this is in Scotland, and we can bring forward our dates by about two to three weeks here in the south west.

Obviously, every year's weather is different, so the dates vary considerably. Grass only grows when the ambient temperature is 5°C or higher. A cold (or dry) February or March delays things; a mild or wet February or March brings them forward. Farmers milk yields in April depend largely on the 'spring flush' of growth - the crucial moment when the grass grows faster than the stock can eat it. This tends to be around 20<sup>th</sup> April, but can, if spring is cold and late (as in 2006 and this year) be up to a month later. At the moment the grass does not seem to be growing at all well. The end of this week (20<sup>th</sup> March) will perhaps be a little warmer and wetter.

Sadly, along with this type of weather, we are bound to have stronger winds from the west. The barometer is already dropping below 1030 millibars, the point at which it has been hovering for quite a long time - with a typical high pressure area dominating the weather patterns over Western Europe. Our normal weather has been forced south so that temperatures and general weather conditions over Spain, Southern France, Italy and the Mediterranean Islands have been most untypical, eg. snow in Venice, temperatures in Corfu lower than in London - with rain and gales to boot.

Perhaps we will have a much better summer this year, as long as it remembers to rain occasionally, not too much and not too little, and at the right time to suit farmers and the rest of us. (Cloud cuckoo land I feel, JT!) We must remain optimistic and get the BBQ's ready, fit new water butts, and check over the lawn mowers, etc. And don't forget the "Spring Cleaning"!

Finally, I hope you will all make a note in your diaries about our forthcoming South Milton Flower Festival. It will be held in the church throughout the holiday week-end from Friday 26th to Monday 31st May. This year the theme of the Festival will be the History of the Village of South Milton, and there will be an exhibition in the Village Hall covering this theme. This will include a new slide show of images of the village covering "Then and Now" which is being put together by the South Milton History Group. It will be a really colourful and interesting event, so don't miss it! And bring along any friends or relatives that you may have staying for the holiday week-end - they are sure to enjoy it. I shall look forward to seeing you all there.

That's all for this time. Enjoy the Spring!







# TRAMP

Revived, we climbed through the wood to the viewpoint at Sharpitor and then on to East Soar Farm, admiring the many fungi we passed on the way and wondering if they were edible! We returned to the car-park, thankful the rain had not arrived and having enjoyed another Tramps walk.

It was third time lucky for Tramps this year. By the morning of Wednesday 20th January the rain, snow and ice had temporarily gone, so we were able to set off from Torcross on a leisurely

walk. It was also planned to be a 'birding' walk and started well with views of three ruddy duck, gadwall, pochard and plenty of tufted duck as well as large numbers of coot. As we headed along the line I saw three Slavonian grebes come into view a few yards from the shore. Plans to walk round the ley were thwarted by very high levels of water, due to the culvert being blocked at Torcross, and these same high water levels meant there were no snipe or water

rails to be seen, although one was heard squealing.

A few of us tried wading through the water and as we did so we disturbed a buzzard. As we retraced our steps we were on the lookout for the marsh harrier that has been seen in this area, and tried to have a second look at two swans we had seen earlier that might be Bewicks, but to no avail. Altogether over twenty-four different species of bird were seen on this short walk. We are really lucky to live so near to this wonderful wildlife and scenery.

A bitterly cold and frosty night may have dissuaded some members from attempting this longer walk on the morning of Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> February, but a bright cloudless sky after

breakfast and the assurance of the opportunity to break off at the halfway stage swelled the starting numbers to eight plus two dogs. It was rather unfortunate that other activities clashed with this event, as we had planned a 9.5 miler with plenty of varied and interesting scenery and terrain, including views of Salcombe Harbour and Kingsbridge Estuary plus inland farm and woodland walking.

Leaving Malborough at 10.00 o'clock we headed south to Portlemore Barton, Plympton Farm and Combe, where a sharp left turn onto a steep track took us up to the edge of Collatondown Plantation whence a turn to the right led to Collaton Wood and to North Sands, again turning back inland to Hangar Mill. From here we climbed via Motherhill Farm to Batson Cross, having covered 3.5 miles in just short of 2 hours. 



# WI NEWS



# **February**

Head adornment was on the cards as Margaret Duffy told us how she makes metal and gemstone wedding head-dresses and feather 'fascinators', mostly for the bridal trade. Ostrich feathers are the ones most commonly used, imported from Australia, where they are processed and dyed. At the end of the meeting almost all of the forty-odd members present were sporting a colour coordinated feathery adornment - which alas had to be returned to Margaret's sample box at the end of the meeting. With one exception; a member who was soon to be returning to her Australian homeland to celebrate a special birthday was allowed to purchase a fascinating concoction to match her party dress!

One of our two teams entered in the county quiz at Blackawton returned home triumphant. Joan Booth, Normal Kendall, Judith Le Grice and Lisa White received well-deserved applause and congratulations on their victory. The final will shortly take place at at Clyst St Mary - watch this space!

### March

Three new members were welcomed. A much less frivolous speaker came to this meeting in the form of **David Ramsden** of the Ashburton-based Barn Owl Trust. The main thrust of this very small charity is all about conserving the barn owl *in its* environment. With huge changes in agricultural methods, loss of habitat and traffic accidents, great toll is being taken of barn owl numbers. Having twice surveyed the whole of Devon and Cornwall - amongst its many other owl-related works - it has established that some 10% of all Britain's barn owls are to be found in Devon.

It was fascinating to hear recordings of tawny, little and barn owl calls, the first two being the ones we would be most likely to hear, as vocally the barn owl is the most quiet member of this family. A barn owl's diet is mainly of field voles, hunted in winter over a 'homeland' of some three to four miles which in summer, with more lush growth, is reduced to about three-quarters of a mile. Our more severe weather this winter is likely to have caused the deaths of many of the 2009-hatched young. "Nothing can be conserved in isolation" was how David concluded his excellent talk - which left us all with a good deal of food for thought!

A coach party organised by Thurlestone, accompanied by members from nearby WIs, started off early on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> March to spend the day at the Festival of Performing Arts at the Barnfield Theatre in Exeter, returning by early evening slightly exhausted but greatly stimulated and enthused by taking part in the day's programme of singing and acting.

# At the Bridge Table

As promised in my previous article, here are two examples of using Stayman in game-going situations. In the first the bidding went-

South (dealer)	West	North	East
1NT	Pass	2 Clubs (1)	Pass
2 Hearts (2)	Pass	3 Hearts (3)	Pass
4 Hearts (4)	All Pass		

Notes: (1) Stayman - asking for a four card major.

- (2) Four hearts (possibly also 4 Spades).
- (3) Inviting to game in Hearts.
- (4) Accepting with a maximum point count.

With invitational to game or better values - 11 or more points facing a 12-14 1NT-opener - responder should bid Stayman whenever he has precisely a four-card major (except when he has no potential to trump - i.e. a 4333 shape - where a raise in No Trumps is preferred.

Plan the play: Contract: 4 Hearts. Opening lead: King of Spades. The trap declarer must not fall into is to take the trump finesse. If it loses and another trump is returned, declarer is only able to ruff

one Club in dummy or one Diamond in hand. Down one. The answer is to win the Lead with the Ace of Spades, cross to the Ace of Hearts, and return to the King (especially as you are missing both the Queen and the 10 of Hearts). Leave the master trump outstanding. Declarer cashes the Ace, King of Clubs, ruffs a Club, back to the King of Diamonds and over to the Ace of Diamonds, ruffs a third Diamond, ruffs a fourth Club and now leads a fourth Diamond. East can ruff in, whenever, but you will be always left with 11 tricks made.

The second example is complicated by an interference bid as follows:-

South		West	North	East
1NT	m Birthon	2 Spades	3Spades (1)	Pass
4 Hearts		All Pass	<u>-</u> .	

Notes: (1) Bidding the opponents suit acts as Stayman. West having shown spades, the bid shows four cards in the other major,

Partner has opened 1 NT and you are planning to say 2 Clubs to locate a 4-4 major fit, when your right hand opponent overcalls. If you have a game-going Stayman hand you should bid the opponents suit, e.g., 1NT - (2 Diamonds) - 3 Diamonds also acts as Stayman.

The Play: Contract: 4 Hearts. Opening Lead: King of Spades On this deal declarer was faced with a 4-1 trump split and consequently four losers. A Spade, two Hearts and a Club. After winning the Ace of Spades and after the second round of trumps, he had to change tack and throw a losing Spade on the third

winning Diamond. He then must lead a small Club to dummy and hope that West holds the Ace. If East held that card he could win, cash the Queen - Jack of Hearts, drawing all the trumps, and cash Diamonds and Spades. 4 down. Oh dear! Happily all West could do was lead another spade. Declarer ruffed in dummy, cashed Clubs till East ruffed in, and all he could do was take his winning Queen of trumps. 10 tricks made!



# Chicken in cider with apples (serves 4)

Spring time and visitors! Here is a dish which may be made in advance and frozen. I hope the sun will shine. For a traditional roast chicken, see Simon Hopkinson's book (below).

# Ingredients

4 chicken breasts, preferably with skin on (you could use a whole chicken jointed)

25g butter

dessert spoon sunflower oil

# The sauce

25g butter

100g mushrooms sliced

½ pt dry cider

1 teaspoon thyme

extra salt to taste

2 tablespoons crème fraîche

1 onion finely chopped

25g plain flour

½ pt hot chicken stock

freshly ground black pepper

zest one small orange

2 eating apples (e.g. Cox or Braeburn) sliced into segments

# **Preparation**

- # Heat butter and oil in frying pan, add chicken breasts and fry on both sides until golden.
- # Remove and place in casserole dish
- # Wash out the frying pan with hot chicken stock and reserve
- # Melt butter in saucepan, add onion and sweat gently until soft
- # Add the mushrooms and cook until soft
- # Stir in the flour and add stock from the chicken pan, cider, thyme and black pepper
- # When thickened and gently bubbling remove from heat and stir in crème fraîche and orange zest
- # Place apple segments around chicken and cover in sauce
- # Cover casserole and cook in moderate oven gas Mk4, 170°C) for 1hr or until chicken is tender.





# HORSWELL DIARY

"Oh, dear! Oh, dear!" muttered the white rabbit in Alice in Wonderland, on his way to see the Duchess, 'I shall be too late!'

As, yet again, I overstep the deadline for the Horswell Diary, I can share his anxiety.

"Oh, the Duchess!" he cried, holding a pair of white gloves in one hand and a large fan in the other, "Oh, won't she be savage if I've kept her waiting!"

The Duchess' fondness for rewarding any misdemeanour with the order to "Cut off her head!" has me scurrying, not down a rabbit hole, but to my office desk and the laptop that sits upon it, lest the Village Voice editor starts sharpening her axe!

In Lewis Carroll's book, Alice begins her adventures by finding a tiny golden key on the top of a glass table. It is too small for all the doors in the long hall around her, but then she finds, 'almost by accident', a little door about fifteen inches high. The door opens when she inserts the key, revealing 'the loveliest garden she has ever seen' and she longs to wander there, 'among the beds of bright flowers and the cool fountains'...and thus her exploration of life in Wonderland begins.

Nineteen years ago, I too found a small 'golden key', a tiny advertisement in the Sunday Times property pages. This is what it said: "A Queen Anne mansion in need of total restoration, near Thurlestone, Devon. Enquiries to P.O.Box 1234"

Sharing Alice's curiosity, and all of her impatience, I immediately jumped into the car and scoured the area in and around Thurlestone searching for what my 'twitching whiskers' told me was going to be a suitable project to lure us away from our farm in Oxfordshire. Unable to find anything remotely Queen Anne I drove to the highest point I could find and scanned the horizon for rooftops and tall trees. Taking a bearing from a group of Scots pines, I wiggled and wove

around the narrow lanes which eventually brought me, 'almost by accident' to the entrance to Horswell House. Of course I should have stopped there, but my 'golden key' was burning a hole in my pocket, so I turned in through the old stone gateway and crept up the drive, dreading the embarrassment of being caught.

It had started to rain, a sudden Devonshire deluge that made the windscreen wipers squeak with the effort of clearing away so much water. Back and forth, back and forth they went, obscuring my view. And then, suddenly, I saw her and it felt as if my heart stood still. In front of me was a tall derelict old lady, elegant, desolate and dignified. With her windows shuttered and her porch sagging onto two steel props she stood hunched and huddled against the rain. She seemed sad and exhausted, as if, despite her best efforts at grandeur, her life force was slowly ebbing away. But to me, she looked like a sleeping beauty in a tangled wood, waiting for the loving kiss that would bring her back to life. It didn't need a printed label saying 'Buy Me' to tell me I'd found our new home. Like Alice, I could see the potential for the 'loveliest garden' and longed to 'wander among the bright flowers and cool fountains'...and thus our life creating the wonderland that is Horswell began.

Over the years we may not have had too many encounters with gryphons, dodos or mock-turtles but we've certainly had many hilarious games of croquet (albeit accompanied by peacocks rather than flamingos), tea parties as mad as any hatter's, and, after several glasses of house wine, may even have danced the odd lobster quadrille. And as for caterpillars, we now have one as large as a box hedge, complete with a top hat. But one of our most memorable encounters must surely have been our meeting with Bertie, our Briard, who, right from the very beginning was clearly as delighted to live at Horswell as we have been.

It all began with a photograph of a rather scruffy looking black puppy in the Kingsbridge Gazette. According to the accompanying article he was a stray, found wandering on the beach, undernourished and with behavioural problems so bad that unless a suitable home could be found for him, he would have to be put to sleep. I knew straight away that he deserved better than that, and that with two friendly dogs here already to keep him company, we were just the home he needed.

"Don't tell my husband," I told Johanna who worked for us at the time, "but I'm going to go and have a look at that dog. He's being kept at the local veterinary practice."

I don't know how she kept a straight face, because, so I learned later, only half an hour earlier my husband had said to her,

"Don't tell Prunella, but I'm going down to the vet's to take a look at that dog!"

As I was shown into the room where various cats and dogs were waiting in their cages I kind of sensed that he was at the far end, to my left. I purposely turned right, slowly looking at all the other animals, talking to each one in turn. I wanted to give 'our' stray time to get used to me, to weigh me up and know that I would love him and be kind. As I worked my way towards him, I could sense his impatience, almost as if I could hear him saying, "No, don't waste time on them. I'm here, over here!" The young veterinary nurse was waiting by his cage. As I approached she said,

"Please don't be upset. He's afraid of strangers and will probably hide at the back of his pen."

She lifted a large flap on the top of the cage. Whoosh! Just like a jack-in-a-box, up he popped in a flurry of long dark fur so that his huge head, front paws and shoulders were out of the cage, and planted a big wet kiss on my forehead.

"I think he likes you," she said.

It was love at first sight. I put my name down on the list of would-be adopters, aware for the first time that the name above mine on the list was that of my husband! I think I badgered the vet every day until eventually they said that yes, we could come and take him home. He slept like a baby on my lap. When we arrived, I woke him up and said, "This is Horswell. Your new home." He jumped out of the car, and taking his time, looked up at the house and all around him as if re-acquainting himself with somewhere familiar. Then suddenly he turned to me, spiralled up in the air like a dolphin through water and planted another of his wet kisses on my forehead.

If ever a dog was meant to live at Horswell, it was Bertie. From that first moment onwards he was lord of the manor. While the other dogs would happily enter the house through the kitchen, Bertie would wait to be let in through the front door. While they would lie contentedly in front of the Aga, Bertie would slope off to the office to sit in the winged chair until called for dinner. Frequently, as we drove away in the car, we would get the eerie feeling that we were not alone. A glance in the rear-view mirror would be greeted by a pair of doggy eyes peering back from the back seat where Bertie had somehow been hiding.

As the years went by we felt increasingly sure that he was the reincarnation of a previous owner of Horswell and that we were merely his cook and chauffeur. He repaid our devotion with warmth, humour, loyalty and courage every day of the long sixteen years he spent with us. Even when he was ill, deaf and almost blind, he still insisted on sleeping across the doorway so that he would be the first to defend us from intruders. He died just a few weeks ago and we are still struggling to fill the gap that he has left in our lives. But in one way, the timing of his death was perfect. He would never have forgiven us for taking him away from his beloved home. Horswell is where he belonged. And so we thought, until very recently, did we.


